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WARNING SIGNS OF POSSIBLE FORGERY



Document Itself

- 1. Are there corrections, cross-outs, overwriting, erasures, tears, tracing?
- 2. Is the document in exceptionally pristine or battered condition?
- 3. Was an old letterhead used in an effort to backdate document?
- 4. Are there pages, paragraphs or sentences that appear out of sequence?
- 5. Is there more than on type style/font used to create the document?
- 6. Is there a letter, card, etc. with the envelope missing? (thus no date verification)
- 7. Does the signature appear genuine, but the contents of the document are suspicious? (This can indicate a possible substitution of pages.)
- 8. Are ink patterns over days, weeks or months too consistent?

 (Sometimes calendars, diaries, medical records, have been recopied, or re-created.)
- 9. Are several different inks/pens used on a single document?
- 10. If typewritten or computer generated, does the material line up consistently?
- 11. Is the type font a different style on the portion of the disputed document?

Circumstances Surrounding the Document

- 1. Are the original witnesses deceased, unavailable or unknown?
- 2. Was the document discovered under unusual or timely circumstances? Belated disclosure?
- 3. Are only photocopies available?
- 4. Is the client or claimant reluctant or unwilling to produce originals?
- 5. Is the client or claimant reluctant or unwilling to undergo requested writing?
- 6. Does the client, claimant or witness repeatedly point out items to support the document's authenticity?
